

Nomination for RCR Challenge Medical Specialist – Troy Jones

Troy Jones is a Paramedic and Clinical Educator with NSW Ambulance in Gilgandra, Western New South Wales (NSW), a Retained Firefighter with Fire and Rescue NSW, and a Medical Assessor with ARRO.

Prior to commencing with NSW Ambulance, Troy served as a Paramedic in the Northern Territory for over 8 years, responding to the varying needs associated by a largely populated multicultural and diverse community, building on the skills and experience required as a leader in rescue and trauma care.

Troy has devoted his time and expertise to support the development and growth of regional and remote trauma response in NSW, including pioneering the inaugural ARRO Multi-Agency Rail Rescue Training Event in May 2023.

This event saw teams across all NSW emergency service agencies, converge at the Australian Rail Track Corporation (ARTC) Rail Yards in Dubbo to collaborate and share best practice on technical and trauma rescue techniques in complex and evolving scenarios involving rolling stock and vehicles. The success of this event has set the foundation for delivery expansion across the state in the coming months.

Troy's growth mindset, coupled with a passion to build the next generation of leaders in paramedicine and trauma care, is a driving force behind his ability to design and develop training programs tailored to deliver better rescue outcomes for rescue operators.

As a leading educator in his field, and through his contributions to ARRO, Troy is committed to upskilling and developing first responders and rescue operators; supporting ARRO's mission to improve the quality of trauma services in rescue operations.

Committed to ARRO's vision and goals, and as the RCR Challenge Medical Specialist, Troy will bring more simulation and realism to challenges that reflect the true essence crews are likely to be faced with in the real situations.
